GOAL				
<p>The objective of this course is to discuss the nature of primitives in word formation, revisiting the status of roots and formal features. The course takes a part-based view of morphology, and the discussion is conducted by exploring the structure of words and their constituent parts, through a survey of the morphological and morphosyntactic system of Portuguese. To this end, the course covers topics related to the morphological structure of words in the Portuguese system and discusses how combinatorial principles produce morphologically complex objects. The course also compares different theoretical approaches to morphology, with a special focus on neoconstructionist approaches based on a syntactic view of word formation, as we explore morphological phenomena.</p>
